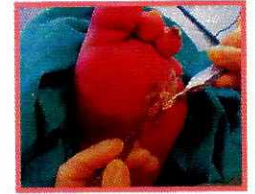

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Wounds represent a physical psychological and social problem which can be rectified. This national CME on advances in wound care is an initiative for a nationwide awareness campaign to draw attention to the serious problem of fresh and chronic wounds a condition that affects millions of Indians today. One of the biggest problems is a lack of awareness and knowledge of the severity and suffering experienced by wound sufferers, particularly the chronic wound.

The CME strives to raise awareness, develop knowledge and encourage best practice in the application of effective wound management. This is an effort to network with many different groups in the healthcare profession to promote and disseminate evidenced based practices. The CME seeks participation from doctors, nurses, hospital administrators, as well as allied health workers including podiatrists, occupational therapists, each requiring different but integrated messages.

Modern healthcare in India has tremendous impact in preventive and curative medicine particularly in big cities, but even there access to evidence based best practice in wound care is lagging. Most patients with wounds receive suboptimal care and are not aware of how to access best practice in wound care. The CME would cover topics that met the following objectives.

- 1. Discuss updates in the assessment and standards of care for commonly encountered wounds.
- 2. Identify systemic and local factors associated with wound prevention and treatment outcomes.
- 3. Describe advances in the prevention and management of the most prevalent wounds.
- 4. Appraise the evidence base of commonly used wound prevention and patient care strategies.

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
