**Convocation Address by  
Professor Ramesh C. Deka, Director, AIIMS, New Delhi**

I am delighted to be present here at Tiruvalla, Kerala on the occasion of the annual Convocation of the Pushpagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre (PIMS), Tiruvallatoday. I thank you for inviting me to address the convocation.

Firstly, I congratulate you all on your successful completion of studies and getting a university degree. It's a great feeling. In a person's academic life this is a historic moment. I wish to commend you for your such work in a rural setup.

Our country and more so this region, needs trained manpower in all these areas. Trained manpower is the real asset of any nation. We need to work for improving our health sector in terms of producing competent workforce, delivering affordable, quality health care for all. We need to take measures to prevent and control diseases with a holistic approach. In this connection I urge the college and hospital which has shown, remarkable leadership in the area of health education in this region, to take up larger projects like building more postgraduate courses including superspeciality areas of medicine like cardiology, cardiac surgery, neurology, neurosurgery, endocrinology, urology and also organ transplant surgery to name few and to produce quality health care workforce in this region. I would like to urge you and the institute to make provision of advance laboratories and infrastructures in the hospital for the students and the faculty to undertake research and innovative work and produce significant works in the medical sector.

The Indian economy has improved significantly and the Government's emphasis to improve the base and quality of education and health-care systems is clear from the massive national programmes like universal Right to Education and National Rural Health Mission. Since our Prime Minister launched the NRHM in 2005, the central government has allocated a huge amount of money to the states for this purpose. We have also now enough funds from different agencies (ICMR, DST, DBT, CSIR etc.) for research and it is you young fiends, You need to take advantage of that and apply for research grants to conduct research.

We are aware that our country is still passing through a very crucial phase of development due to rapid increase in population. Our leaders are faced with the challenges to reconcile between poverty and plenty, development and corruption, tradition and modernism and most importantly for the urban and rural divide. The rural health sector in India is in a very bad shape. Access to healthcare for basic and primary diseases such as diarrhoea and respiratory infections is not available for a large section of our rural population. Kerala has however done better than other states in India, especially with regard to reduced infant and maternal mortality rates. It is the responsibility of all of us medical professionals to ensure that every Indian has access to primary health care, including safe conduct of delivery and care of women's health. Commercial interests should be set aside when we consider right to health.

This institute is growing out of a Church organization. Christian health care institutions, including their medical colleges have set remarkably high standards in care and compassion. I look forward to this institution and its products witnessing this tradition and making a name for itself in the lines of its predecessors.

Ladies and gentlemen, Young friends, You can play a very important role for development and to improve quality of life of Indian citizen through sincere and dedicated work. There are of course many challenges before you and accept these challenges and convert them into opportunities and build your career with confidence and serve the nation with commitment to professional ethics. Now it is time to catch up with the development. The central government has allocated funds but the development would happen only with the local initiatives and the involvement of the local people. I am confident, you can do it and you will.

Needless to say that the economy of our country is linked to globalization. There are apprehensions about this model but the fact is that each one of us today is connected, thanks to the technology, to the global village. To catch up with the developments in science, technology and medicine we need partnership with the developed countries. We need to collaborate with other institutions within India and also abroad to achieve that goal.
